EVENTS AT USCIS FIELD OFFICES

During May, 2018, 5 Voter Registration Drives were conducted at the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Center in Centennial. A total of 92 paper applications were collected by 22 Circulators (some worked more than once).

Voter Registration activities expanded to include a VRD at the Alamo Drafthouse Theater and another at the Douglas County Library in Parker.

Marilyn Ayers and Marlu Burkamp conducted these drives at which a total of 10 applications were collected.

During the month of June, within 22 days of the primary elect ions, no paper applications may be collected. However, Circulators will be distributing info folders with information and instructions for voting online right up to and including June 26.

Volunteers who are not yet certified in 2018 as Circulators are welcome to participate. The swearing-in ceremonies begin usually at 2 p.m. and last about one hour.

The dates for June are 14, 19, and 22 (1 p.m.).On June 27, 2 p.m., we will resume our regular Voter Registration Drive format at USCIS when workers must be certified as Circulators. For more information or to volunteer, contact Gladys Hodges, hgladys5066@yahoo .com, 915-525-4982 .

PRIMARY ELECTIONS

UNAFFILIATED VOTERS & PRIMARY PARTICIPATION - CHOOSE JUST ONE!

Unaffiliated voters can now participate in the upcoming Colorado primaries. The law only allows you to vote in one primary. Ballots will be mailed the first week of June and you can choose now to receive just one in the mail.

It's Quick and Easy to get just one ballot in the mail. Go to https://www.sos.state.co.us/pubs/elections/chooseU/choiceHappens.html.

- Click on the gray bar below to start the process.
 - Picking the ballot of a political party does not affiliate you with either of these major political parties, it just allows for
 you to have one ballot mailed to you.
 - o Verify your voter registration
 - o Pick the party's ballot you want to receive in the mail

Or You Will Receive both ballots in the mail.

- If you do not choose a ballot now, don't worry. Just know you will receive both ballots in the mail. But remember to fill outonly one (Democratic or Republican).

All ballots will be mailed the first week of June.

DOUGLAS COUNTY BALLOTS -

Primary Election ballots arriving by mail after June 4

If you are a registered voter and have not received your ballot at the address associated with your voter registration by June 11, you may obtain a replacement ballot by contacting Douglas County Elections.

If you live in Douglas County, plan to vote in the Primary Election and are not registered to vote, Colorado election law allows voter registration on or before Election Day.

Be election ready. Visit the Douglas County <u>Ballot Information page</u> to review a sample composite ballot for all items on Douglas County ballots. Additional information about the ballot will be added to this page as it becomes available.

Looking for a way to register online? Visit <u>Douglas Votes.com</u> where you may register to vote, check voter registration status, change your mailing address, check the status of your mail ballot, find a ballot Drop-off Location, and more.

Know the ballot deadline. Your ballot must be received by 7 p.m. on June 26, Election Day. A postmark of June 26 is not valid as the received date. Your ballot must be in a designated ballot box or you must be in line at a ballot Drop-off Location or Voter Service and Polling Center no later than the close of polls at 7 p.m. on Election Day, June 26.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY REFERRED BALLOT MEASURES

The General Assembly has referred several measures to the November 2018 ballot. They are as fo llows :

- * Amendment V Proposes a reduction in the age qualification for running for the General Assembly from 25 years to 21 years.
- * Amendment W- Judicial language ballot language change Under the current language in the constitution, county clerks are required to write a separate retention question for each justice or judge on the ballot for retention. This would allow county clerks to write a single ballot question for each level of court s. It would shorten and simplify the ballot.
- * Amendment X moves industrial hemp from constitutional to statutory regulation Changes the definition of Industrial Hemp from a constitutional definition to a statutory definition. It would define Industrial Hemp accordingly with the federal definition in state st atutes.
- * Amendment Y Congressional Redistricting Establishes a 12-member, independent, citizen commission to draw Congressional boundaries. The Commission is comprised of 4 members from each major political party and 4 citizens who are unaffiliated.
- * Amendment Z Legislative Redistricting - Establishes a 12-membe, rindependent, citizen commission to draw state legislative boundaries. The Commission is comprised of 4 members from each major political party and of 4 citizens who are unaffiliated.
- * Amendment A Repeal the exception to the constitutional ban on slavery Prohibits slavery and involuntary servitude as a punishment for a crime and in all other circumstances.




EQUIPMENT LOG
